Food Recovery:

Capturing Abundance

25,000-40,000 lbs annual average of tree fruit, berries and vegetables

Harvesting from backyards, homesteads, hobby farms and commercial growers

Estimated 40 distribution sites

Delivered training to 5 regional food banks to improve outcomes

Integrating minimal processing to extend storage life and attractiveness of whole local vegetables




Our host sites are community partners

DATA COLLECTION & REPORTING

- Weekly data collection: food waste weight & contamination
 - Collected through Smartsheet
 - Recorded by We Compost team and host site champions
- Monthly & annual reports are sent to host sites
- Data collection is essential in determining site progress



YTD pounds food waste diverted from landfill: ~42,356, 20% increase from '23
